- 2. Annual SSSML Lecture: Mormonism as a Case Study: The Growth of New Religious Movements (A Panel Discussion), October 25, 1989, 7:30 p.m., at 375 ELWC, Brigham Young University. The two speakers include Rodney Stark, Professor of Sociology, University of Washington who will speak on "Modernization and Mormon Growth: The Secularization Theories Revisited."

Jan Shipps, Professor of Religious Studies and History, Indiana University-Purdue University at Indianapolis will speak on "Making Saints: In the Early Days and in the Latter Days." Eileen Barker, Professor of Sociology, London School of Economics, and Darwin L. Thomas, Professor of Sociology, Brigham Young University will respond to Professors Stark and Shipps. The lecture is co-sponsored by The Society for the Sociological Study of Mormon Life, the Society for the Scientific Study of Religion and the College of Family, Home, and Social Sciences, the Charles Redd Center for Western Studies, the Women's Research Institute, the Center for Studies of the Family, Brigham Young University. The panel discussion will be repeated as the Friday Plenary Session at the Society for the Scientific Study of Religion annual meetings on October 27, 1989, 8:15 p.m., Marriott Hotel, Salt Lake City.

## **RECENT CONFERENCES**

SSSML members Tim B. Heaton, Larry Iannaccone, Grame Lang, Armand L. Mauss, Rod Stark, Daryl White, O. Kendall White and Larry Young all recently participated at the 1989 Association for the Sociology of Religion meetings held August 6-9 in San Francisco. The only paper to deal directly with Mormon life was presented by O. Kendall White and Daryl White. A short abstract of their paper follows:

O. Kendall White and Daryl White, "Reflections on the Question of Mormon Ethnicity." Following a brief discussion of the application of the concept of ethnicity to explain nineteenth century Mormon experience, this paper examines Armand Mauss's analysis of the ideological uses of "Mormon ethnicity" among scholars and within the Mormon community. While Mauss concludes that the conceptualization of Mormonism in terms of ethnicity may profitably be abandoned, we argue that such conceptualization remains meaningful for understanding modern Mormonism.

It should be noted that Armand Mauss was discussant for the session in which White and White presented their paper. The dialogue between the presenters and the discussant was lively, to say the least.

Several SSSML members also participated at the 1989 Sunstone Symposium in Salt Lake City held last August. A future newsletter will summarize some of the sessions which might be of particular interest to SSSML members.

## **CONFERENCES IN THE NEAR FUTURE**

 The Society for the Scientific Study of Religion (jointly with the Religious Research Association) will hold its annual meetings at the Salt Lake City Marriott Hotel in Salt Lake City on October 27-29, 1989. The theme of the conference this time will be "Religion, Diversity and Change." This is the first time SSSR has held its meetings in the Western United States and future opportunities for hosting the meetings in the West are somewhat contingent upon adequate attendance at these meetings. Please encourage colleagues who might be interested in the meetings to consider attending.

This year's meetings will have a special focus on Mormon related issues and SSSML members are broadly represented on the program. Nine sessions are devoted exclusively to Mormon topics. Several other sessions include one or more papers dealing with Mormonism. At last count, over 40 papers will deal with some aspect of Mormon life and it is anticipated that at least one book dealing with the social scientific study of Mormonism will emerge from the meetings.

Besides the intellectual fare itself, there will be opportunities for interaction with SSSML members, especially at the annual business meeting to be held Friday Afternoon.

2. Several SSSML members spent time at BYU during the Summer of 1989 working on on-going research projects. Extending their research interest in African-Americans and Mormonism, Daryl and Kendall White spent several weeks for a second summer examining the Black Mormon oral histories at the Charles Redd Center at BYU. They will present a paper on Black Mormons in the South at the key symposium on "African-Americans and the South" at the Southern Anthropological Society meetings in Atlanta, Georgia in April 1990. Also, pending acceptance, they will present a paper on African-American Mormons at the annual meetings of the American Anthropological Association in Washington, D.C. in November 1989. This research constitutes part of a book they are writing on Blacks and Mormonism.

Graeme Lang, Associate Professor of Sociology at Memorial University of Newfoundland, made his initial visit to Utah and BYU during August of 1989. His research focused on Mormon imagery of heaven and hell and is part of a larger comparative study on the sociology of heaven and hell. Graeme's SSSR paper will focus on this issue.
