## **President's Message**

Dear Colleagues,

This is my farewell message as president of the MSSA. At our October meeting in Denver the torch was passed to our capable colleague Ryan Cragun. Since I assumed the post of MSSA president, a number of changes have taken place, both within our little organization and within the sociological study of Mormonism.

With respect to the MSSA, our central challenge remains recruiting new members that are not only interested in joining the organization, but also volunteering and contributing their time to help run it. The economic recession hasn't helped matters, as travel money is low hanging fruit for budget cuts, and graduate students—our principal source of new members—are loathe to spend what little funds they have on attending a small conference like SSSR. We know that cuts to travel funds have thinned our ranks at the annual meeting for three years running. Nevertheless, this year in Denver we saw some new faces, and we hope these budding scholars will join our ranks and help us advance the social scientific study of Mormonism.

With respect to the state of the social scientific study of Mormonism, the past few years have seen the MSSA take a prominent role in advancing the profile of the field. The most significant contribution during my tenure as MSSA president was the publication of the edited volume assessing the Thomas F. O'Dea's The Mormons. This book is both edited by, and contains several essays by, MSSA members. The book has been a great boon for our organization both in raising our profile, and in providing revenues that we can use for future activities. The editors, **BYU** professors Cardell Jacobson, John Hoffman, and Tim Heaton graciously agreed to donate all proceeds from the book to the MSSA. (For those who have not had a chance to purchase this book, it is entitled Revisiting Thomas F. O'Dea's The Mormons, published by University of Utah Press.)

At the meeting in Denver we discussed how we could use money from the O'Dea book to invite a high profile speaker for the biennial Vernon Lecture, which will be presented at next year's meeting in Baltimore. Soon you will receive a call for nominations for a speaker,

# Sunstone - Summer 2009 - by Rene Romig

Apart from the usual summer hot weather and perhaps a little free time, this August brought with it the unique experience of attending the Sunstone Symposium. I arrived at the conference as a curious first-timer, ready to take a short break from pure Mormon history (for the past few months, I had been busily giving tours of Joseph and

Emma Smith's homes at the Joseph Smith Historic Site in Nauvoo, Illinois) and delve into another facet of Mormon studies, one that might better satisfy my appetite for the sociology of religion.

It soon became clear to me that the Sunstone Symposium could very well merit a sociological study in and of itself! Intriguing people, intense camaraderie, refreshingly honest stories, and unique ideas abounded. Star scholars such as D. Michael Quinn, David Knowlton, Linda Newell, and many others freely presented their research and ideas. And for the sociologically minded like our MSSA membership, there was no lack of thoughtprovoking material and detailed scholarship.

Although the overall theme of the symposium was Celebrating Mormon Women's Contributions to Church and Culture, sessions and panels ranged in focus from theology to commentary on current events. Sociologist Tania Lyon toyed with the notion of applying the Toyota business model to the LDS church, identifying corporate practices that could aid in church growth and organization. Other scholars examined the role of the priesthood in various restoration traditions such as the LDS church and the Community of Christ, which extends priesthood to

women. Still others discussed the topic of polygamy through examinations of the recent FLDS raids and panels on ways to provide social services to the current polygamist community. Issues connected to homosexuality, perspectives on church history, and more, were explored through poems, essays, articles, and films.

One session was particularly memorable. During a plenary session entitled "The Dynamics of Power and Authority in the LDS Church," five individuals—a homosexual man, an LDS woman, a long-time LDS member who is African American, a Community of Christ apostle, and an organizational psychologist—offered their perspectives on the theme. Some of the stories were touchingly personal. All provoked more questions on inclusion, exclusion, social structure, race, religion, and the like.

I came away from the symposium feeling refreshed and reflective. For anyone curious about social issues and Mormonism, Sunstone stands as an invaluable source of discussion, creative energy, and scholarship.
